SJA VOLUNTEER VACCINATOR



A year in the life of a St John Ambulance volunteer vaccinator



Towards the end of 2020, an unexpected email appeared in my inbox. It was from St John Ambulance (SJA) who were starting one of the

largest recruitment drives in their history to find and train tens of thousands of volunteers to support the imminent mass vaccination programme across the UK. I jumped at the chance to be able to contribute to this process and signed up. Less than 24 hours later I had an online interview with one of the SJA volunteer recruiting team and was accepted on to the scheme.

The next stage of the process was to complete a range of NHS and SJA online learning modules covering subjects ranging from data protection, covid-19, the different types of vaccine available, how to administer the vaccine and key first aid reminders. This was followed in early January 2021 with a face-to-face training and assessment session with SJA. This was a strange experience, being in a room with around twenty other trainees and SJA trainers for the first time since lockdown in March 2020. Spending the entire day in full PPE was a challenge. On completing this assessment, I was able to start work at the mass vaccination centre initially at Epsom Racecourse which then moved to Sandown Park (to make way

for the Derby at Epsom – a welcome sign of "normality" starting to return). Since qualifying I have completed around 50 shifts on six different sites and have administered nearly 1000 doses of vaccine (including flu jabs at one site).

There is a wonderful sense of teamwork and a shared purpose at each site. with volunteers from SJA and similar organisations (including, on occasions, members of the UK armed forces) working closely alongside medical professionals from the NHS and other healthcare providers. Supporting members of the public coming for their jabs is both a privilege and a real pleasure. Everyone's always at least a little bit nervous, that's only natural, and I look to put them at their ease as best I can. On every shift I've had a "lump in the throat" moment ranging from reading the many thank you cards sent to the team at Epsom, to reassuring those people with significant dislike of needles (which includes me!).

It's fascinating working with so many volunteers from different backgrounds and many of us have built long-lasting relationships with our colleagues. The current mass vaccination programme will end one day, but I hope we will be able to find a way to continue to use the enthusiasm and expertise of this army of volunteers for future projects.



THE HUT & THE READING ROOM

Update on behalf of the Trustees of the Reading Room, and of the Hut

At the AGM of the Hut, which was held at the Reading Room on Tuesday, 23 November 2021, a decision was taken that the Reading Room, or to be precise Westcott Village Hall Trust CIO ("the CIO"), should replace the individual retiring trustees of the Hut. That change has now been processed by the Charity Commission. For the first time therefore, the Reading Room and the Hut have come under the control of a single group of trustees, thus creating hope that whatever the village of Westcott ultimately decides it would like out of its key physical assets can be delivered without the historic disagreements and delays in decision-making which created such financial risks that nothing ever happened.



However, the progress just made is only a first step on a long journey and I am now asked by the trustees to help them explain to the village what needs to follow. To start with the very basics, the current trustees of the CIO are Alan Reif, Hugh Parry, Steve Brooks, Janet Phillips and Andrew Lewis. They all live in the village.

Constitutionally, they can make decisions on behalf of the CIO as to how the Reading Room operates; as the CIO is now also the sole trustee of the Hut, they (through the CIO) can also determine how the Hut functions, but...

In all the trustees do or don't do, they have to act in full compliance with the law as it applies to charities and to do so in the interests of the inhabitants of Westcott. We, as villagers, are the ultimate beneficiaries of the bequests by which the Reading Room and the Hut were given to the village. The current trustees all came to their roles in the weird and wonderful ways in which these things happen in any village; at some point or other, someone asked for 'help running the village hall', and they agreed to volunteer their time to look after the buildings, to prepare the accounts, to arrange bookings and cleaning rotas etc. None of them claim deep expertise in merging charities, applying for Planning, running building projects etc and the first thing the current trustees have asked me to say is that if anyone in the village feels they might have a useful contribution to make to such processes, then the trustees would

welcome hearing about that.

So what comes next? The answer is that before anything remotely exciting can happen, the trustees have to overcome a number of legal issues rooted in the way both buildings were given to the village. The CIO 'operates' the Reading Room, but it



does not 'own' it. It holds it as trustee of the original charity by which the Reading Room was founded in 1892, a dormant charity known as Westcott Reading Room Trust. The terms of that trust are incredibly restrictive. To be frank, they make it almost impossible to see how the Reading Room will suffer anything other than a slow and painful decline as the physical fabric of the building becomes more difficult to maintain.

Happily, and somewhat ironically, the solution might be provided by the Hut, which of course is already in terrible disrepair. The Hut building is 'owned' by a charity called The Hut Westcott, of which the CIO has just become the sole trustee. The deed which established The Hut Westcott in 1959 contains trust terms which are more flexible. Subject to agreement by the Charity Commission, they might allow dealings with the Hut's land and buildings if the outcome is to provide better and more suitable provision of a village hall somewhere in Westcott, not necessarily on the site where the Hut is now located. However, whilst the Hut's trust terms are more favourable when it comes to dealings with its land and buildings, the Hut's constitution is hopelessly out of date, meaning that it will be difficult for the CIO to run the Hut efficiently.

The trustees have taken specialist legal advice on this issue and have negotiated the outline of a solution to the problem with the Charity Commission. In simple terms, and using an analogy which appeals to me as a classic car owner, it involves taking the good engine from a badly rusted vehicle and putting that into the sound body of a car which has blown its own motor. That way, after many hours covered in grease, you end up with one vehicle that you can actually use.

Therefore, against the background that both charities were established with almost identical purposes, i.e. to provide a village hall for the inhabitants of

Westcott, the trustees intend now to consult with the village on a so-called 'Cy-près' scheme whereby with the approval of the Charity Commission:

- the land at the Reading Room would be transferred to the Hut, thereby also becoming subject to the more favourable trust terms which already apply to the land at the Hut; and
- the constitution of the Hut would be updated, so that the CIO is able to exercise its powers as sole trustee of the Hut more akin to its own management rules.

The way this process works, is that the trustees will open a formal consultation period with the village which will run from Wednesday, 22 December 2021 until the conclusion of a public open meeting to be held in the Reading Room on Tuesday, 22 February 2022 at 8pm. A formal notice to such effect appears elsewhere in this magazine. A copy of this update, of the formal notice and of a number of background documents to explain what is proposed in more detail can be viewed at www.westcottvillagehall.com. The website also has a facility to allow you to comment and to ask further questions. The formal notice also sets out other means of commenting for those who prefer not to use the internet.

I would emphasise that the consultation on the 'Cy-près' scheme will not involve consideration of any plans for the redevelopment of either the Reading Room or the Hut sites. To stay with my above classic car analogy, until one roadworthy vehicle rolls out of the shed, there is no point in planning any journeys in it. Only if and when the Charity Commission has agreed that the village is content that the reorganisation should proceed, will the trustees be in the position to determine what redevelopment proposals may be affordable and might secure Planning. All that is for the future, and the Charity Commission will insist on a further consultation exercise with the village if we get that far.

THE DISTRICT COUNCILLOR WRITES...



Happy New Year

The end of 2021 was an immensely busy time as District Councillor and for the Council as a whole, and 2022 promises to start in an equal manner.

Looking back, the Council made its submission to the Local Government Boundary Commission for England where for Westcott we stressed:

"The village of Westcott is currently served by one councillor. Whilst geographically it could be joined to Dorking North to create a three-member ward, there was general agreement that joining the village and town would limit community cohesion, given the very different needs and issues of the two communities.

The Local Government Boundary Commission for England

For example, the Westcott Neighbourhood Development Plan specifically seeks to prevent community merger with Dorking. It was felt that Westcott has much stronger affiliations with the rural wards which surround it to the north, south and west."

We shall wait and see for another

month or so quite what the Commission makes of it all and whether we are to be merged in with half a dozen surrounding



villages or consumed into Dorking.

Planning Department Update

Planning applications create uncertainty both for the person that has submitted them, in finding out whether they will be able to go ahead with what can sometimes be life changing projects, and also for those surrounding any development site where the impact can be not insignificant.

From the number of planning waiting applications to be determined within Westcott iust now, it can be appreciated that this level of uncertainty is collectively risina. A recent meeting of the Council's cabinet acknowledged that the timescales for responding to applications are still not good enough and reported that:

THE DISTRICT COUNCILLOR WRITES... (cont.)

"The Council has targets to determine planning applications within certain timescales; within 13 weeks for major applications, and within 8 weeks for minor and 'other' applications, unless in circumstances beneficial to the application, an extension of time is agreed with an applicant. Whilst performance continues to be below target for both minor and 'other' applications, the speed of validating applications is improving as is the speed of determining applications. However, it will take some time for performance to return to normal levels due to previous resourcing issue."

In the long term though (once it's built, it is built), it is important that decisions are made correctly and appropriately and the officer team remain focused on just that.

Alongside reviewing applications, the planning team can also help out when things do not go according to plan. A number of residents have contacted me recently about the former Cricketers Pub in the village.

The planning team have visited the site and written to the owners asking them to make repairs to the building. If a satisfactory response is not received then the planners will look to use formally a Section 215 Notice which they feel would be justified in the event of insufficient voluntary action.

Council Budget 2022-23

This time around, Westcott's District Councillor is the chairman of the council's Standing Budget Panel which looks to see if due process has been undertaken in creating the budget for next year. The Panel is not there to determine how your money gets prioritised but to report on whether a proper process has been completed.



As it stands whilst writing this, following on from previous spending decisions, next year the council needs to grow income and/or make savings of between £400,000 and £900,000 or between 4% and 9% of the council's overall spending.

Much of what the council spends your money on covers statutory items and so there are only a limited range of decisions that they can actually make including cutting services and charging you more for the services that they provide.



A WALK ON THE WILD SIDE





The red hat and I have been busy continuing to explore the less trodden trails in the Surrey Hills, whilst walking my stepson's dog, twice

or even 3 times a week. Sometimes accompanied by a brave friend who is prepared to venture into the unknown with me, at other times on my own. Part of the attraction is that we often do not know where we are(!) but with each passing week, landmarks are beginning to become recognised. The following area has become a particular favourite, and it has been a pleasure to introduce family and friends to it.

Although many readers may be familiar with Norbury Park, I wonder how many have found the "Wild Coffee" van right in the heart of the woods? I came across it quite by accident, at a junction of 5 trails, near the wood yard and boundary fence of the big house. 4 days a week, (Thursday - Sunday, 9am-3pm) a lovely couple, Phil and Pam, run this coffee stop. A large, welcoming, wood fire and logs and picnic tables to sit at dominate the clearing. Marshmallows on sticks for children to roast, and even dog treats for our 4 footed friends! At busy times you may have to wait, but with each coffee or hot chocolate (with marshmallows, of course!) individually prepared, and so much choice of cuppa, this is no hardship.

It's not actually difficult to find the site when you know where it is. The easiest access trails are from either the Norbury Park car park off the A246, as though going to Bocketts Farm, or from the NP Crabtree park on Lane Westhumble. At the top of each of these car parks there is a map and an easy to follow path that brings you after about a mile to the clearing. Of course, if you want a longer walk to earn your coffee, there is no shortage of trails. An 8Km circular walk will take in the grounds of Polesden Lacey, or Ranmore, or Denbies, or within this distance are a great choice of shorter trails, or you could even make your way to Boxhill,

the choice is yours! Hubby John settles for the easy trail from the car park, which is also ideal for small children, usually timed to meet me after my longer dog walk.



Except for the longer trails through the woods, walking boots are not necessary, trainers are fine but I wouldn't recommend high heels!

I hope some of you will set forth and find this unique spot for yourselves, it is too good a "find" to keep to myself!

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP



Detecting history under our feet - Mark Davison

On Tuesday, November 9, Mark Davison gave us an enthralling illustrated talk about the interesting objects he had found using his metal detector here in the fields and byways of Westcott and its surrounds.



He has been a keen detectorist since his younger days but 12 years ago he took up metal detecting seriously and he is the only person allowed to be a detectorist on Hugh Broom's farmland at Milton Court and Sondes Place. The soil is particularly good – easy to dig and not at all clay-ey like elsewhere south of Dorking.

He began hunting on Reigate Heath in 1985-86 where there had been a racecourse in the 1850s and early 1860s. One of his earliest finds on the heath was a Charles II (1660-85) farthing dated 1672. These earlier finds were mostly buckles and buttons as well as threepenny pieces, florins,

shillings, sixpences and occasional halfcrowns. Some finds of historical interest from Surrey included a King Charles II horse bridle badge thought to have been detached from the royal entourage as it arrived at Epsom Downs in September 1662 en-route to Earl Berkeley's home at The Durdans, Chalk Lane. Other notable finds included two ancient coins – one from the time of Antoninus Pius in the 1st Century AD, which was detected at Capel in 2009; and an Edward II (1307-27) silver penny unearthed at Leigh more recently.

Most of Mark's success has been near Westcott beside and in the Broom farm fields where he has found most of his collection. A few valuable historical coins have turned up among a mass of buttons and buckles and some livery badges and horse brasses. The important coins and artefacts have been reported to the Surrey Archaeology organisation which identifies them and then records them with the Portable Antiquities Scheme run by the British Museum.

Outstanding items of interest include a silver denarius coin of Mark Anthony and Octavian dated circa 41 BC. Discoveries from Sondes Place Farm include a silver halfpenny of Richard II (1377-99) and a Henry II penny (1154-1189). Livery badges of the Barclay family of Bury Hill including Arthur Kett Barclay were of particular interest locally. Mark showed pictures of many Roman coins from the time of the emperor Constantine 341 – 340 AD.



Mark's best finds include a Roman 22 carat gold coin marked REX on one side and a warrior on horseback on the other dating back to the time of King Verica in 30AD. Another remarkable coin was a silver denarius coin minted in Sicily in 42 BC and issued during the reign of Sextus Pompey, son of Pompey the Great. Some ancient bronze potin coins dating to 75 BC to 50BC have also been found.

half or quarters to provide half pennies as well as farthings was in fact approved as it was easier than making impossibly small silver coins in mediaeval times. The slides of his finds cleverly depicted the clean coin mounted on a background of the stubble field where he had found it.



During excavations on the farm for the new silage works this year, Mark found several Roman coins. One, from circa 141 AD, was issued by the Roman empress Faustina Senior. Some of Mark's favourites include a Magnentius coin of about 350 AD, a gold 1889 sovereign, and a Henry VIII groat (1509-1547). Curious artefacts included a silver Cornish Pixie charm.

As he said in conclusion: "If only these coins could talk they would reveal an amazing piece of history".



DORKING MUSEUM



Dorking Museum wishes a happy new year to all readers and to our supporters and friends. The Museum re-opens after the festive break on 6th January and we look forward to opening our doors again to welcome you back, subject to any change in covid restrictions.

How do you celebrate New Year?

Has much changed since, writing in 1876, South Street linen-draper Charles Rose recorded his memories of Dorking in the 1820s, 200 years ago? Ringers rung 'the old year out and the new year in'," he wrote, commending the skill of the Dorking 'ringers'. "Some in the olden period," he added, "danced 'the old year out and the new year in,' others thought it more becoming to spend the last moments of the old and the earliest of the new year in meditation and prayer, while of course the majority of the population passed the boundary line of time in unconscious repose."

It seems that more celebratory effort in those days went into "Old Christmas, or Twelfth Day" (January 5th or 6th), a remnant of the switch from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar in 1752. Some families refused to acknowledge the 'loss' of twelve days in the changeover and saved their best Christmas fare for this day, when "the last Christmas pudding was eaten, the last Christmas game was played, and after then the holly disappeared till the arrival

of another Christmas season." In the 1870s, Queen Victoria banned rowdy Twelfth Night festivities as they were becoming a threat to Civil Peace!

The Museum's current special exhibition, 'Darking 1620', was originally planned for 2020 to mark the 400th anniversary of the sailing of The Mayflower, carrying William Mullins and his family to the New World. Like other events in Dorking, however, it was a victim of the Lockdown – but all good things are worth waiting for and, in the last few months of last year, it proved a particularly popular attraction with visitors and is being retained for early 2022.

The postponement perhaps gave it a new significance with November representing the 400th anniversary of the first 'Thanksgiving' feast in the colony. In fact, it was only in the latter part of the 19th century that the Mayflower pilgrims and Thanksgiving

inextricably linked. became An appealing story of the Mayflower and the 'first' Thanksgiving was effectively 'conjured up' in the Victorian era and was one that the whole nation could celebrate - native Americans welcomed starvina Europeans, helped them survive and joined them in a celebratory feast - a wholesome founding myth that all Americans could sign up to without the stigma of slavery, massacre or exploitation.



Well it's a new year and as the last of the Christmas turkey has been made into its final curry we turn our thoughts to the year ahead – and, of course, the obligatory new year's resolutions. - 2. Framing them with negative language. If our goal is to stop eating junk foods this carries negative connotations every time we mention what we're aiming for, therefore drawing attention to the very thing we are trying to avoid. If we put a positive spin on it Eat more healthy foods for example this reinforces the positive and what we're aiming for.
- 3. The other thing people do is to make new year's resolutions that don't actually reflect what they really want. People are easily influenced by family, friends and societal pressures and will often tag along just to fit in. This results in promises being made that are bound to be broken.

Whilst I reflected on all this it made me wonder about the promises made by our leaders at COP 26 and how many of these promises may have already fallen foul of the trap of the new year's resolution?

Behaviour change is tricky and any world leader would need to be a brave soul to attempt to bring about the massive changes needed to avert the climate catastrophe that we are heading for unless our governments do just that - change.





Reflections on COP26

I was in Glasgow for the second week of COP26, to witness this conference of global leaders and to join the huge march attended by a coalition of organisations, activists and indigenous leaders calling for Climate Justice - to agree to act swiftly to reduce emissions and protect the natural world, to provide adequate finance to help vulnerable countries adapt to climate change and agree reparations for loss and damage already happening in the Global South.

We may or may not recognise it, but our futures, and those of our children and grandchildren, are inextricably interconnected with the futures of those living and caring for their children and grandchildren, in the Global South (and with all other forms of life of our living planet). Our comfort and convenience is entangled with suffering and destruction elsewhere in the world.

Injustice is a root cause of the climate crisis, with the richest 10% of people being responsible for almost 50% of carbon emissions, whilst marginalised communities, those bearing the least responsibility, are currently facing the brunt of the impacts.

So it felt important to listen to and amplify the voices of the vouth representing the most affected peoples and areas (MAPA), who are now experiencing increasing drought, famine and flooding, and who came to Glasgow to bear witness to the issues they face. As COP26 neared the final days, with emission reduction commitments still off track to limit warming to 1.5 and little action on loss and damage, their understandable anger was palpable.

'I have missed school to be here. What am I going to go back and say to my people?...We are victims of the crisis we never created. We are fed up with your pledges and your targets for 2030, 2050. We need climate action now because we are suffering the effects of the crisis now.' Patience Nabukalu from Uganda

This speech delivered by Mia Mottley, Prime Minister of Barbados, in the opening days of the conference eloquently sums it up:



Mia Mottley at COP 26

'Failure to provide the critical finance, and that of loss and damage, is measured, my friends, in lives and livelihoods in our communities. This is immoral. And it is unjust, what must we say to our people living on the frontline, in the Caribbean, in Africa, in Latin America, in the Pacific. What

excuse should we give for the failure?

Are we so blinded and hardened that we can no longer appreciate the cries of humanity? Do some leaders in this world believe that they can survive and thrive on their own? Have they not learnt from the pandemic? Can there be peace and prosperity if one third of the world literally prospers and the other two thirds of the world live under siege and face calamitous threats to our wellbeing?

We must act in the interest of all our people who are dependent on us and if we don't, we will allow the path of greed and selfishness to sow the seeds of our common destruction. For those who have eves to see, for those who have ears to listen and for those who have a heart to feel - 1.5 is what we need to survive. Two degrees ... is a death sentence for the people of Antiqua and Barbuda, for the people of the Maldives, for the people of Dominica and Fiji, for the people of Kenya and Mozambique and yes, for the people of Samoa and Barbados. We do not want that dreaded death sentence.
