

...FROM THE CHURCH IN WESTCOTT





THE VILLAGE CHURCH, FOR THE WHOLE VILLAGE

I was recently looking through a box of historical documents in the church, a fascinating step back in time, giving glimpses of the past such as the introduction of electric lighting (and electricity bills!), to a discussion on whether to take out extra war insurance.

One book that was of particular interest was the "rent" book from 1852. Did you know when the church was first built you had to

rent your seat? The church then was quite a bit smaller than today, and the book records the names of those who had paid up for the year, and therefore secured their place on a Sunday.

I am pleased to say that only three years later, something, or someone recognised that going to church shouldn't be dependent on ability to pay! Accessibility is the watchword of today, but in 1855 it was clearly also an issue. The famous architect (Gilbert-Scott) who designed the church, made radical changes to increase the capacity of the building, making a significant sacrifice to the original

design in the process (it was originally designed in the shape of a cross), to make the building accessible to the whole village. Grants were sought for extra "free" seating, a requirement for which was that they should be located in the best parts of the church i.e. with a good view of the preacher and not be facing away from the altar. The church was rammed with seating, probably far beyond what would be acceptable for fire regulations today – with up to 50 children seated on benches under the belltower, where we currently

have the Creche room.

IF YOU HAVEN'T BEEN IN CHURCH RECENTLY, DO POP IN AND HAVE A LOOK.

Accessibility today has thankfully moved on from whether you can (or want to!) pay for your seat in a Sunday service. But

making church accessible is still an ongoing project for us. By the time this goes to print I hope we will be well underway with the installation of an accessible toilet, generously funded by the legacy of a former member of our congregation. A much overdue provision for those who cannot use our current facilities. We also have a hearing loop, and the service words can be followed on an iPad for those who find that easier to see.



...FROM THE CHURCH IN WESTCOTT



If you have visited church in the last couple of years you will have also noticed that we no longer have been temporarily pews, havina removed facilitate to distancing during the pandemic. The flexibility to adapt to the myriad of changing rules on social distancing, proved invaluable, especially when managing "bubbles" to maximise capacity for significant events such as weddings and funerals. But we were also struck by the fact that we had made the church accessible for wheelchair users, and parents with buggies. Instead of sitting to one side with a poor view of the preacher and no view of the altar (considered to be an issue even in 1855!), now families could sit together and join in fully with the service.

Not having the pews has also opened up the church as a large community space for the village, in a way it hasn't before. We have more flexibility for concert seating, and events with people sitting at tables – most notable recently was the Ukraine fundraiser, where the church was packed for a very enjoyable night of fish and chips, a quiz and c.£2,500 raised for humanitarian relief in Ukraine.

The PCC has decided to apply to make the change permanent, and not lose the benefits we have experienced for accessibility and community use. Of course with any change there can be a sense of loss. We understand that the old seating has been used for significant events over the years, and features, for example, in many wedding photos (including my own!). As of today, the temporary nature of the change also means the interior could look better. and so if the change is permanently approved, we plan to do work to smarten up the floor and buy new chairs so we don't have to use plastic ones for big events.

If you haven't been in church recently, do pop in and have a look. The church is open in the daytime, and we get positive comments on how light and airy it now feels. There is also a display board at the back of church describing the plans.

Our aim is to have a village church that is accessible and usable for everyone in the village. We stand on the shoulders of our forebears in that endeayour.

BALANCING JUSTICE: BEING A MAGISTRATE AND A CHRISTIAN - ARE THEY COMPATIBLE?

DIEU-ET-MON-DROIT (God and my right – the motto of the British Monarch)



I have been a Magistrate (JP) for over 22 years and an active member of church communities in London and

Westcott, and I believe that being a JP and a Christian are compatible.

Our summary justice system was founded with the magistracy at the centre. Magistrates are unpaid volunteers and have dispensed justice in their local communities for more than 650 years, since Justices of the Peace Act introduced the novel proposition that decent members of the community, not themselves lawyers, should be vested with the power to administer justice. We are not judges and do not wear gowns and wigs. That is not to say that the magistracy hasn't changed since then. Thankfully, it has. JPs are a vibrant and diverse group and closely represent the communities they serve. I am particularly impressed by the improvements relating to gender and ethnicity.

The role has changed over time, and will continue to do so as communities change. But the qualities of today's magistracy – fairness, good character, understanding of people and the

application of sound judgement – have been constant for decades.

The word "justice" gets bandied about a lot. We talk about justice, injustice, social justice, doing justice, and whether or not justice has been served. It seems many of us use different definitions of justice. What seems "just" to one person seems "unjust" to another. What is a Christian perspective and definition of justice?

When Scripture says God is righteous, it is saying God is just. In Romans, Paul has much to say about the "righteousness of God" (Romans 3:21-22). I'd like to suggest four aspects of biblical justice that relate back to my role as a Magistrate.

Personal Accountability: For many modern people, justice has only one aspect, personal accountability. This aspect is certainly part of the biblical definition of justice. When a person does something wrong, a person in authority (judge, king, God, etc.) assigns a commensurate penalty for that crime. In other words, justice is served when the guilty individual is called to account

Fairness: Doing justice means not giving an unfair advantage to some people over others. Because ancient

Israel was an agrarian society, the Bible often uses terms relating to measurements. balances. weights to express the fairness aspect of justice. People traded with goods like grain and oil. There was a natural temptation for merchants to give a slightly better exchange rate to certain people over others. After all, who would notice? God noticed. He noticed every time people used an unequal weight or measurement (Proverbs 11:1: 16:10-11: 20:23). Justice is not only a matter of the courtroom but also the marketplace. It is not just police officers, judges, and lawyers who should be concerned about justice, but every person who interacts with others. Justice demands we ask the question, "Is this fair?"

Collective Responsibility: An aspect of biblical justice that many modern people struggle to understand is collective responsibility. We tend to create a false dichotomy between collective responsibility and personal accountability. Many think it must be one or the other, but it is actually both. Human beings are than individuals. We are part of social groups, and communities, nations. We influence one another Our choices both benefit and harm others. So, injustice is often a tangled social web we weave and it touches nearly everyone in society. Justice demands that we take responsibility for our community and JPs represent that community. It means we speak up against unfairness and mistreatment. It also means we attempt to repair what others (including previous generations) have broken.

Merciful Generosity: The biblical concept of justice does not pit mercy against justice but ties it all together. Biblical justice is loving, merciful, gracious, generous, and restorative. As mentioned earlier, Jesus considered charity an act of doing justice or practicing righteousness (Matthew 6:1-2). When we provide food, clothing, and shelter to those in need, we are doing justice or acting righteously.

The bad news is, we've all participated in injustice. We've been selfish, shirked away from our personal and collective responsibilities, treated people unfairly, and withheld good from people when it was within our power to do it. That is why, in love, Jesus has become the human representative we so desperately need. Though he was personally innocent, he took responsibility. He offered himself as the atonina sacrifice, so that humanity could be held accountable and also have mercy extended to them (see Romans 3:21-26).

When we adopt the biblical perspective on justice, we can never self-righteously stand in condemnation of others. Only those who adopt a humble posture of repentance and faith will be "justified" (Luke 18:9-14).





Indigo Spice/Cricketers

Contrary to the grapevine in the village, the WVA has been working behind the scenes to firstly get the owner of Indigo Spice to make the exterior of the building more presentable. MVDC, at our request, has issued him with an improvement notice on the basis that the building is highly visible, within the village Conservation Area, and within the AONB. We will continue to exert pressure to ensure the work is properly completed.

Secondly, we have tried over the last three years to encourage the owner to put forward a Planning Application which complies with the Westcott Neighbourhood Development Plan. and have offered him a number of potential solutions for him to pursue to overcome the parking issue which is causing the main sticking point. At the end of the day the WVA has no power over a private property owner to do anything and can only encourage compliance with planning policies. This is frustrating when the building is so visible within the village.

Street Clean

Chairman's Charities

For the year ahead, the Council Chairman has the opportunity to choose to support local charities and I am really pleased that Paul has selected two with Westcott connections.



Leatherhead Start (www.leatherhead start.org) provides emergency, direct access, short-term accommodation for homeless men and women over the age of 18. Priority is given to those with a local connection to Mole Valley. It was once known as Leatherhead Night Hostel and the hostel staff team is employed and supported by a volunteer Board of Trustees and Directors, headed by their Chair, Myfanwy Tothill, who many Westcott residents will remember from her time teaching at Westcott CofE First School.

Leatherhead Starts' team of twelve people support their clients throughout their time at the hostel and into the wider community. The project support workers staff the hostel on a 24/7 rota and assist the hostel clients individually through the key-working process, using the Outcome Star model.

The tenant support worker continues this assistance when clients move out

of the hostel and into independent accommodation and, in conjunction with the learning development worker, runs a regular tenancy training programme.

The learning development worker assesses each client for education, training, volunteering and work needs, sourcing and providing daytime activities to address their requirements. She also recruits and manages a team of volunteers and organises events, trips and entertainments.

Paul's other charity is Dorking Men's Shed, part of the UK Men's Sheds Association. I know that there are several Westcott folks active in Dorking Men's Shed and their website (www.dorkingshed.org.uk) is a great place to go to find out how they are supporting mental health and our community

THE PAST IS A FOREIGN COUNTRY - THEY DO THINGS DIFFERENTLY THERE



On page 17 there are some details of Platinum Jubilee celebrations in the village. Going back over 100 years here is an account of the celebrations held in 1918.

'At last. Our prayers are answered, and God has given us Peace - peace with honour, through the bravery and endurance of our men and our women. That is how God generally works, through us.' So wrote the Vicar at the end of the First World War, and the parish magazine went on to describe '...a procession from the Vicarage to the Church, headed by the Old Nines, whose music throughout the day was of the greatest value to us. Flags of the Allies, and a Peace Dove carried by children from the Albany Home, made for colour and spectacular effect. The Church was crammed even to the porch, and such hearty singing has never been surpassed. After the service the children were packed into beautifully decorated wagons, provided with musical instruments, and departed for a drive round the village, making a joyful noise. The afternoon was fully occupied with sports, which went off extremely well. The prizes were kindly given away by Mrs Carey Druce in the evening, just when the rain was setting in. The rain was unfortunate, but the Torchlight Procession and Bonfire seemed to take no heed of it, and everybody went to bed at a very late hour, tired but happy.'

There won't be any readers who recall these celebrations more than one



hundred years ago, but some may remember the street parties celebrated that the end of the Second World War. This was the gathering in Bailey Road.

The Albany Home was an orphanage at the far end of Parsonage Lane (now a private house), but the Local History Group would welcome information about the 'Old Nines', who provided the music for the parade around the village in 1918.

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP



Lonesome Lodge, Broadmoor on 10th May by Robin Daly

Back in November 2019 at the last lecture held in the Reading Room, Robin Daly gave us the story of Broadmoor Hamlet in the Tillingbourne valley. This began around 1600 and there were about 8 dwellings on the earliest map from 1762. He has followed this up with the story of Lonesome Lodge, a Palladian mansion, designed and built in about 1740 by Theodore Jacobsen, a London trader and gentleman architect.

Robin Daly is the Chairman of a charity called 'YestoLife' which helps people and families in various ways when they are enduring the rigours of cancer treatment. The website for the charity is http://www.yestolife.org.uk. Donations can be sent by cheque to: Yestolife, 7 Paynes Park, Hitchin, Herts. SG5 1EH. Please be generous.

Several members of the Capel History Society and Robin Daly have compiled a 100 page illustrated booklet about the five families associated with Lonesome Lodge over its 114 years from building in about 1740 to its demolition in 1854 by the Duke of Norfolk and being rebuilt as Tillingbourne House a few miles further down the valley. In 1724 Theodore Jacobsen (1686-1772), who had made his fortune trading in London with the Hanseatic ports of Northern Europe, visited the Dorking countryside and was

inspired by the natural beauty of the area between Leith Hill and Wotton with its streams and ponds. Dorkina had acquired a reputation for its fish dish called 'Water Souchy' made as a soup

with small fish, particularly perch, carp and tench from the many local mill ponds, served with white wine and parsley. Many people visited Dorking in search of this delicacy.

Jacobsen began buying portions of surrounding land from Broadmoor over to Squires Farm and by the time he sold the estate in 1763 it amounted to some 440 acres. He had bought about 6 separate lots of land at about £10 per acre. His inspiration for the house was the Villa Ragona in Italy, and it was finished with sumptuous interior rooms and landscaped around a large pond with decorative fountains and trees on the slopes behind. Theodore Jacobsen had very deep pockets and lavished attention on creating his idyllic summer retreat.

He sold the whole estate in 1763 to Jeremiah Joye, a London merchant and stockbroker for £8,500. Jeremiah died within 3 years and the estate passed to his wife Mary Margaret with

an ample inheritance but she chose not to remain at 'Lonesome' and in 1767 John Gritton, Jeremiah's nephew and executor, sold the property.

David Franco, a very wealthy diamond dealer and business man in London. bought the Lonesome Estate at the 1767 auction for £10,000 including many farms and fields. When Franco died in 1778, eleven years later, he left the estate in trust for his daughter Catherine, wife of Daniel Haynes, and her family. He also left many generous bequests to various members of his family and staff who had worked for him, and to The London Hospital. After the deaths of Daniel and Catherine. the estate passed first to William, the eldest son, until he died in 1804, and then to David until 1811 when it passed to his son Daniel Franco Haynes. The estate was broken up and it was sold to Robert Barclay of Bury Hill for £9450 in 1821. Daniel and Mary Haynes moved to Ashtead and had three children between 1820 and 1825, but Mary eloped with an Irish man and was divorced by Daniel by an Act of Parliament.

Robert Barclay had bought Bury Hill with some 1000 acres in 1815 and when his son Gurney died in 1820 Robert also bought the Lonesome Estate for his widowed daughter-inlaw Mary Elizabeth (Freshfield) who, after 3 marriages to husbands who died, lived at 15 Berkeley Square with 10 servants to the age of 80. In 1831 the estate was sold by Barclay to the Rev Thomas Haughton Harding and it was renamed Tillingbourne Lodge. The Tillinabourne Estate was then sold in 1840 to the Duke of Norfolk for £14,000. It was methodically dismantled in 1854 and rebuilt further north as a smaller Steward's Lodge. It was let to a series of tenants and it was used both by the Army and the Youth Hostel Association. but by 1960 it was deteriorating and was demolished. Today the footprint of Lonesome Lodge and the remnants of the landscaping remain in the hands of Wotton Estate.

Robin Daly provided a most intriguing account of the events and personalities in the life of Jacobsen's magical creation in the Tillingbourne Valley.

There will not be a lecture in August but we anticipate a lecture with the AGM on Tuesday 13th September. As always we remind members that ideas for talk subjects and lecturers they may meet will always be welcomed by the WLHG committee.



Plastic, love it or hate it – it could be here to stay!

When thinking about what to write, I got to thinking about what irks me? At the moment it's plastic. Now don't get me wrong – I do not live a plastic free life – but boy would I like to. So, what's stopping me? I guess the fundamental problem is, that it is easy to use and hard to avoid. Although there have been many initiatives from supermarkets, to get rid of their single use bags in favour of "Bags for Life", there is still a lot of packaging which I have to deal with when I unpack at home.

So where does all this single use plastic go. In the UK I'm sure that many of us are doing our bit to try to reduce our plastic waste but the truth is that plastics are still being produced. With this being the case and knowing that there is a fundamental problem with it, something surely has to change!

National Α report 2020 by Geographic, predicted that - "plastic trash that flows into the oceans every year is expected to nearly triple by 2040 to 29 million metric tons". This astounding and somewhat depressing figure was part of a two year study by Pew Charitable Trusts & System IQ Ltd. They report that global plastic production is on track to increase 40% by 2030, with hundreds of billions of dollars being invested in new plastic production plants, locking us into the status quo. Their solution is for a complete overhaul of the plastics industry, replacing it with a circular economy, which recycles and reuses whatever we have already in the system, rather than creating more as is currently the case. They estimate that to implement this new system would cost \$600 billion which, believe it or not, is in fact a saving of \$70 billion, on the current costs of running the plastics industry as it currently stands.



73% of all litter on our beaches worldwide, is made of plastic and 40% of all plastic made, is single use, meaning it can't be recycled! These figures are not only disturbing but worrying for our wildlife. The fish in our seas are now being affected by these plastics which start to break down into micro plastics which can end up inside the fish we eat. Its one thing to do a litter pick and clear up all the large pieces of rubbish we see – but trillions of barely visible pieces of plastic are

now floating around in the world's oceans. These are then ingested by wildlife including those in our own food chain.

A review of four decades of research conducted in 2016, indicates that the number of marine fish species found with plastic inside them has quadrupled over that period. It is not surprising that the actual amount of plastic that fish consume depends on how much plastic is in their immediate environment. It stands to reason then, that species that live in ocean regions known to have a lot of plastic pollution, such as the Mediterranean and the coasts of East Asia, were found with more plastic in their stomachs.

Of course many of us are concerned with the amount of plastic ending up in our oceans and it is easy to point the finger at other countries, for example around East Asia, for shoddy practices of getting rid of their plastics. Indeed certain countries are less regulated than others and this can sometimes mean that rubbish ends up being dumped in places like the sea, rather than being recycled.

In 2020, a study by RAJA rated India as the top worst offender for plastic waste in the oceans, with a staggering 126.5 million kg of plastic per year being dumped into the ocean. The USA actually produces double this amount of plastic but not as much of it

ends up in our oceans, or does it? Now before we all jump up and down and declare India to be failing in its duty to help the environment, it helps to know the truth behind the waste disposal of other 'developed' countries.

You see the USA actually exported the equivalent of 1.07 million kg of plastic to other countries to deal with their own waste problem. Some of the countries they exported their waste to, have better waste disposal programs than others, such as Canada or South Korea. But huge quantities of waste were also shipped from the USA to countries with poor waste management systems like Malaysia, Thailand and India, which took 19%, 10% and 12% of US plastic waste respectively.

W h e n countries such as the UK & the US ship their plastic waste abroad they



are unbelievably, able to claim it has been recycled! This then remarkably, fulfills the 'obligation for developed countries to effect a greater positive change for the environment'. So, whilst it is easy for us to point the finger at many poorer countries for their recycling practices, let's not forget the amount of plastic we 'developed' countries are sending their way in our own attempt to claim that we

are fulfilling some environmental obligation.

Well over half of the household plastic packaging the UK government claims is recycled, is actually sent abroad! This is equivalent to three and a half Olympic swimming pools every single day. A few years ago most of our plastic "recycling" went to China; at the moment, more than half is going to Turkey and Malaysia. Once it has left our shores there is no way of tracking the methods of supposed 'recycling' of our waste and our Government chooses to turn a blind eye to the issue. Out of sight out of mind.

The problem isn't that people aren't recycling enough. The problem is that there is still far too much throwaway plastic being produced – so much in fact that we're having to burn it or dump it on other countries to deal with. If the UK produced half as much single-use plastic as it currently does, we could end waste exports altogether, and send less plastic into incineration and landfill.

However, the production of plastic has been and still is, a profitable prospect which began way back in the early decades of the 20th century. The petrol and chemical industries began to form alliances with companies like Dow Chemicals, ExxonMobil, DuPont and BASF. These companies are still

the major producers of raw material resins for the plastics industries today. These alliances were driven by the desire to make use of waste material from processing crude oil and natural gas. Unfortunately, with these big companies still making a profit from the use of their waste materials from oil and gas, the likelihood of anything changing soon is remote.

Unfortunately, the UK makes it into

tenth place of the top ten of plastic dumpers in the world, with 703 thousand kg of plastic dumped each year! This is clearly nothing to be proud of and is not going to reduce all the time new plastics are being made. Surely the solution has to be to stop producing any more plastic. Yet the way we consume, we are constantly perpetuating the problem. Packaging materials, account for almost half of all plastic waste globally! So, while we wait for our own governments to get on board with a total ban on creating more plastic - what can we do to be



part of the solution?
