NEW YEAR, NEW QUESTIONS?

Why is it that the start of a New Year seems to prompt so many of us, amid the fireworks and the enthusiastic renditions of auld lang syne, to strive to 'do better' in the coming year?

This is no new phenomenon. The author Mark Twain wrote the following in a letter on 1

January 1863:

"Yesterday, everybody smoked his last cigar, took his last drink, and swore his last oath. Today, we are a pious and exemplary community. Thirty days from now,

we shall have cast our reformation to the winds and gone to cutting our ancient shortcomings considerably shorter than ever." I no longer make New Year's resolutions, but I do use this season to ask myself searching questions. Is there anything about the way I am living that needs to shift if my practice is to fit with my values and beliefs? Do these values and beliefs that define how I seek to live need to shift according to any new evidence?

The biggest questions we can ask as human beings is whether we have been created with a purpose or are simply a happy cosmic accident. Is there a God? Does it even matter?

You will have guessed from my vocation that the evidence I examined led me to conclude that there is a God, and that this matters a great deal. I am often surprised however, not that people draw different

conclusions to me, but that many people don't take time to look at the evidence.

Francis Collins has been a leading

scientist in the field of genetics for many years, working as the director of the National Human Genome Research Institute and subsequently as the director of the National Institutes of Health. He had concluded that "all of this stuff about religion and faith was a carryover from an earlier, irrational time."

Then, having observed up close the real and tangible difference people's faith made to them, especially in times of suffering, he had a shocking realisation:

"I had made a decision to reject any faith view of the world without ever really knowing what it was that I had rejected. And that worried me. As a scientist, you're not supposed to make decisions without the data. It was pretty clear I hadn't done any data collecting here about what these faiths stood for."

To his surprise, as he rationally explored the evidence it eventually led him to become a Christian. This year – along with whatever resolutions you may or may not make – why not set out to examine afresh some of life's big questions? You may be surprised at where it leads you.

On 2nd December the church was fuller than usual for John's funeral. As a Westcott resident for nearly 35 years, he had lots of village friends who came to say goodbye. In recent years John became good friends with our next-door neighbour lan Hughes, who led the service.

The bible reading and address were based on conversations they'd had about faith, the afterlife, and indeed the probability of God. It was remarkable how many people said afterwards that

these questions never seem to be debated, and how lan's address had made them think in a different way.

One particular thought that resonated was that every doubt implies faith in a stronger alternative conviction, and that we should be as demanding for evidence for the alternative as for the initial proposition that we doubt.





As published in the December 2022 Magazine and noted elsewhere, The Westcott Fellowship Cottage Trust now has a house for allocation. All requests for an application form will remain confidential between Trustees and the Applicant.

Please note that the following criteria will be among those used by Trustees in assessing all applications:

- that Applicants will have a strong association with Westcott and are preferably already living in the village
- the comfort and suitability of the Applicant's present accommodation for them and their household
- the Applicant's current financial situation
- that the best use is made of the accommodation being made available by the Trust

There is no 'waiting list preference' and all applications received by the deadline will be assessed. Applicants then shortlisted will be interviewed by the Trustees - preferably at their current accommodation.

The deadline for submitting a completed written application form is strictly 12noon on 31st January 2023. If you wish to be considered as a potential beneficiary, please contact the Trust without delay.

Polling Station Review

The District Council team have been consulting on how the pattern of Polling Stations across our new ward of Mickleham, Westcott and Okewood should change. Although there was at one point a suggestion that every one of the 1,838 projected voters in Westcott should go to the Reading Room (Village Hall), I am very pleased to say the common sense prevailed and St John's Chapel will remain as a polling station as well. The other places that people in our expanded ward will be able to cast their vote will be:

- Mickleham Village Hall (363 voters)
- The Stepping Stones (608)
- Forest Green Village Hall (469)
- Okewood Hill Village Hall (569)
- Ockley Village Hall (791)
- Abinger Hammer Village Hall (226)
- Evelyn Hall (394)
- Wotton Village Hall (400)



It's a 32 mile round trip just to cover the ten polling stations – or about the equivalent of here to Canary Wharf.

We gathered 15 bags full of rubbish from around the hedgerows, footpaths and public spaces. All this helps make our community tidier. It also serves to help out our local wildlife, by protecting their much loved habitats.



Nature though has started to get its own back on us – this tree is growing directly

through a hub-cap alongside the main road and it wasn't for shifting.

Looking Back Again

Finally, as we near the end of Westcott having its own dedicated District Councillor, it's time to look back again to previous editions of this column. Eight years ago (do the maths, you'll be surprised that eight years ago was only 2015!) our local police team were urging us not to be complacent about the dark nights aiding burglaries. The article bears repeating:

Our local Police team have highlighted to me that the darker evenings tend to see an increase in burglaries. Burglary is a horrible crime to be a victim of, and it's a priority for us to tackle - which is why Surrey Police recently undertook a regional antiburglary campaign with Police in Thames Valley, Sussex and Kent. Their work saw a 15% reduction in burglary over a three week period compared to the previous year and across the region 265 burglary suspects were arrested during the campaign while suspects were charged with 104 burglaries.

The campaign stressed that it is easy to take some simple steps to protect yourself against being burgled: Light It, Lock It, List It.

Light it:

- Install low wattage timed security lighting that stays on throughout the night
- Make sure your house looks occupied even when it isn't. Use an automatic timer switch to turn interior lights on and off

Lock it:

- Keep your front and back doors shut and locked – even when you are at home
- Fit window locks and ensure French windows and patio doors are secure
- Never leave door or car keys or other valuables in reach of a letter box or window
- Secure your garage and shed too equipment kept in a garage or shed

Surrey Police have also highlighted that, as often happens during the winter months, they are seeing an increase in rogue traders preying on the elderly and vulnerable. Rogue traders know that they can cause alarm by pointing out a leaking gutter or damaged roof tiles and some people will be concerned that the rain (or snow) might get into their homes if they don't have the "work" done.



You can help be alert to these potential crimes by booking a free crime reduction survey for your property – just give Surrey police a call via 101.

Coming bang up to date with this advice, this year we are encouraged to "Think WIDE(N)" to have the best possible protection against burglary.

Research shows that a set combination of security actions provides up to 50 times more protection for your home versus no security. A combination of WIDE actions is the most effective and recommended by police throughout the country. Additionally, Neighbourhood Watch believe neighbours keeping an eye out for each other is also key to preventing burglary.

WINDOWS: Lock your windows

INTERIOR: Put your interior lights on a timer

DOORS: Double or deadlock your doors

EXTERIOR: Put your exterior lights on a sensor

(N)EIGHBOURS: Keep an eye out for neighbours

WESTCOTT HISTORY GROUP



Secrets, Sex and Scandals of the Royal Court 1660 – 1830



On the 8th November Sarah Slater, wearing a period gown, the fashion for the time, which she had made herself, provided an intriguing talk on the behaviour of personalities at the time when Hampton Court was the Royal Residence. Sarah is the senior curator and guide at Hampton Court Palace. Those who have visited Hampton Court will know that it was built initially by Cardinal Wolsey starting in the early 1500's but was taken over by Henry VIII.

Royal marriages at that time had only one purpose: to provide a legitimate heir and secure the succession. They were arranged between the Royal Houses and often the couple had not seen each other before the wedding. Love did not play a part. The King was expected to have a mistress or even mistresses to prove his manhood and virility. The resulting illegitimate children were mostly acknowledged and often given titles and positions Quite a few present day at court. aristocratic families can trace their connection back to these affairs. Only if they were the result of a liaison with lower ranks were they denied and given away to be adopted or fostered. When George III and his wife fell passionately in love with each other after their arranged marriage, and he did not want to choose a mistress. the courtiers were dismayed and the aristocratic families who had hoped that one of their daughters would be chosen as mistress were disapproving, as it meant less influence at court and in state affairs.

The Royal wives on the other hand were expected to be pure and faithful. Their sole duty was to provide an heir and a spare. Once they had achieved that a blind eye was turned on the occasional affair provided it was discreet. When Princess Sophie Dorothea, wife of Georg Ludwig of Hanover who later became George I, had a passionate affair with Count Königsmarck she threw discretion to the wind, and the resulting scandal meant that Königsmarck was assassinated and she was incarcerated in an out-of-the-way castle in Germany, where

she lived for the last 30 years of her life. She was never allowed to see her children again. It is hard for us today to understand these double standards.

To get it into historical perspective this talk was about the court in the Stuart period after Queen Elizabeth, the last Tudor Queen, who died in 1603 and was succeeded by James VI of Scotland who was James I of England. His son Charles I reigned through a period of strife and civil war (inter regnum 1649-1660) when Cromwell ruled (ref. Parish Mag March 2015 – Surrey in the Civil War). The Stuarts believed in the divine right of kings to rule rather than the elected representatives and this was resisted by the Puritan Oliver Cromwell.

After Charles I was executed in 1649 Charles II endeavoured to defeat Cromwell but was defeated himself at the Battle of Worcester and fled to France in 1651. He stayed there until 1660 when he was invited back and reigned until 1685, succeeded by his son James II until 1688. Charles II was known as the Merry Monarch and during his reign occurred the Plague (1636), the Fire of London (Sept 1666) and the Sea Battle of Lowestoft (June1665) with the Dutch.

From 1688 we had William III and Mary II, the daughter of James II. They were proclaimed joint sovereigns of England in April 1689 and were accepted by Scotland in June 1689 but not by

Ireland who were still loyal to James II. William III led an army to Ireland and James' supporters were defeated at the Battle of the Boyne in 1690. Mary II died in 1694 and William reigned on his own until his death in 1702. He was succeeded by Queen Anne (sister of Mary II) who was married to Prince George of Denmark, a committed protestant.

The Act of Union in 1707 united the Kingdoms of Scotland and England. Queen Anne reigned until 1714 and was the last



monarch of the Stuarts, as all but one of her 18 children died in infancy. Her son, Prince William, Duke of Gloucester, lived to the age of 11. Then followed the Georges of the House of Hanover and Buckingham Palace became the royal residence for Queen Victoria in 1837.

One wonders whether the NHS midwifery and obstetrics service would have been able to help Queen Anne to save some of her children, and perhaps changed the course of British history!



Westcott Village Hall Development Plan: Update 1



Those of you who were at the WVA Open Meeting on

7th December will already know that there is good news and there is bad news. The bad news (as some may think) is that I am back. The good news is that the plan to do something with The Hut and (what was) The Reading Room may now finally be making some progress.

Not much happened since the Charity Commission aranted the 'Cy-près' scheme in May 2022 which consolidated the old charities into what has now rebranded as Westcott Village Hall. However, those trustees who were in office at the time of the merger did succeed in recruiting a number of additional volunteers as trustees to broaden the representation across the village.

Irrespective of the intention to create a better village hall facility to replace the two existing structures, continuous renewal of the trustee group is a vital aspect of good governance for community assets. As a heads-up, you will see an invitation in the next magazine calling on those interested in becoming trustees to make

themselves known in time for the next renewal cycle, due to take place in May. More details next month.

So where are we now? You may recall that James Leaver and I were heavily involved in the validation exercise which preceded the merger. That was designed to establish whether, in time and with a bit of luck, the numbers might add up to fund the construction of a new village hall. James is a chartered surveyor; I am a solicitor. Both of us have long experience in working on infra-structure projects for institutional and other clients, but neither of us are seasoned 'Project Managers', i.e. the person who actually runs the team of architects, planners, lawyers, quantity surveyors and transport advisers (to name but a few) who need to be hired and managed to lead a planning application process on which the village has been properly consulted.

The trustees have now decided that (i) to make progress, they really do have to appoint a Project Manager and that (ii) he or she can only be effective if working with a small subgroup of trustees, leaving the majority of trustees to concentrate on the daily running of Westcott Village Hall until and unless key decisions require all-trustees approval. In the light of that sensible conclusion, James and I have agreed to return to work probono as part of a Development

We look forward to seeing you all at the woodland in 2023.



How Big is Your Dog's Carbon Paw Changing the biodiversity Print?



In Westcott I think it is fair to say that we are (mostly) a village of dog lovers!

This got me to thinking about the 'carbon paw print' of our pooches. Of course, there is the obvious and immediate environmental impact made by irresponsible dog owners who do not clean up after their dogs, but let's just think about the impact of all those who do?

There is a staggering 1,000 tonnes of faecal waste produced by dogs every day in the U.K. Most of us, I'm pleased to say, scoop this up in a bag before popping it in the many bins provided. Unfortunately, this does mean a lot of plastic going into landfill. It's not just the issue of the plastic being around for decades to come but there is also the issue of noxious fumes created and released into the air from the plastic when incinerated

This means we need to think carefully about what bags we use to dispose of the mess. One easy thing we can do, is to buy biodegradable or compostable poo bags. There are now many on the market, some completely plastic free and even compostable.

There is another problem with doa waste if not picked up. If you have flea, tic and worm treated your dog, the waste left behind has a detrimental impact on the immediate environment where it is left. Topical tic and flea treatments are, in fact, insecticides which is how they end up killing the bugs and fleas that land on your dog. It stands to reason then, that the waste the doas leave behind is also toxic to the natural environment and any bugs that might come into contact with it.

Certain dung beetles, native to the U.K. are particularly at risk, not only from toxic dog faeces but also from the sheep. cow and other livestock wormina treatments which are excreted in their waste. Dog faeces can also cause serious disease in domestic livestock if left in fields. Neosporosis can cause abortion in cattle, while Sarcocystosis can cause neurological disease and death in sheep.

Wildflowers and plants need low nutrient soil to thrive. Soils enriched

with doa faeces encourage the growth of coarser plants such nettles as and thistles. which

compete with and outgrow many wildflowers. The biodiversity of our local landscape needs to be protected in order to maintain a healthy and diverse environment in which wildlife can thrive.

Pet Food Problems

We all know by now that a higher plantbased diet is not only good for us but is also better for the environment. So, how much of an impact does the food our dogs eat, have on the environment?

Pet food is estimated to be responsible for a quarter of the environmental impacts of meat production, including the release of greenhouse gases, phosphates and pesticides. The annual greenhouse gas emissions associated with just dry dog and cat food, equates to 106 million tonnes of carbon dioxide. So how can we, as responsible pet owners, reduce the carbon pawprint of our pet's food?

Well as luck would have it, there are now a number of environmentally friendly dog food products on the market which aim to reduce the impact on the environment. There are even vegan



dog foods which, in a recent study of 2,500 dogs, maintained that "dogs fed a completely vegan diet had fewer vet visits and required less medication than those fed a traditional dog food diet". Of course, each of us has to consider all the facts before making any changes to our dogs' diet, but there is a growing body of evidence to suggest that dogs, like us, are able to thrive on a plant-based diet.

Wildlife Impacts

There is nothing more pleasing than heading up on to Ranmore or the surrounding countryside with your dog and letting them off the lead for a good sniff about. But, what about the impact our dogs have on the local flora and fauna? It may well look like they are having a marvellous time running up and down the Surrey Hills but the impact on local wildlife can be devastating. Several Nature Reserves have recently changed their policies to limit bringing dogs to their sites in view of the negative impacts that dogs have had on their wildlife.

One study showed that hares exposed to still images of dogs were more likely to abort their young, so imagine the impact when they are confronted by a live dog! So, next time you're out for a walk with your dog – be sure to consider not just your own carbon footprint but those of your dog's paws!
